What are Evidence-Based Practices? ~

Evidence-Based Practices (EBPs) are research based findings that are implemented into every day professional practices. EBPs are everywhere!

An example of an evidence-based practice might include universal precautions or infection control for professionals in the medical field.

Why are EBPs important in Early Intervention?

EBPs are important because research tells us (professionals, caregivers, and parents) these approaches have resulted in positive outcomes for children, who may have developmental delays or disabilities, and their families.

Can you tell me more about EBPs?

Division for Early Childhood (DEC) developed a resource guide describing EBPs to professionals in the field of early intervention and early childhood special education. The guide has undergone a number of updates and revisions. The current version organizes the practices into 8 categories.
